about the seminar

In a rapidly globalising world, marked by technological advances and cultural homogenisation, the preservation, reinterpretation, and celebration of traditional cultural practices have become more critical than ever. Indian folk heritage, as an essential element of intangible cultural heritage, serves as a living, breathing tradition, linking the past with the present and offering insights into how communities navigate the complexities of the future.

Folk traditions—whether expressed through oral narratives, music, dance, crafts, or rituals—serve as a mirror of cultural identity, reflecting the values and beliefs of communities. Folklorist Alan Dundes (1965) describes folklore as "expressive culture," helping communities maintain a sense of belonging and continuity. In India, this rich tapestry of expressions reflects the country's regional, linguistic, and religious diversity, adapting over time to the needs and realities of modern society.

The National Seminar on "Deciphering Indian Folk Heritage: Revisiting the Past & Reevaluating the Present to Rethink the Future" aims to explore the diverse dimensions of Indian folk traditions. It attempts to bring together scholars, researchers, practitioners, and cultural advocates to engage in critical discussions on the preservation, promotion, and evolution of folk heritage in the contemporary world. The seminar seeks to foster a deeper understanding of these traditions, their relevance today, and their potential role in shaping future cultural identities.

One major focus of the seminar is to examine the role of oral traditions and performing arts, exploring how they have been preserved and reinterpreted in response to social and technological changes. As Jan Vansina (1985) notes, these narratives are adaptive, evolving forms of cultural memory that resonate with the present. Similarly, the seminar will investigate the ongoing relevance of traditional crafts in a globalized market, as highlighted by Henry Glassie (1999).

The seminar will also address the intersection of ecology and folklore, recognizing the ecological wisdom embedded in folk traditions and their relevance for sustainable practices, as argued by Fikret Berkes (1999). Additionally, it will explore the influence of digital technology on the preservation and dissemination of folk culture, examining the challenges and opportunities in leveraging digital platforms to protect Indian folk traditions in an increasingly interconnected world.

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
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
